

GREAT INVENTIONS THE LIPSTICK



Today, everyone can use lipstick: girls on TV, young people in the park, moms at work, sisters in shopping centers. It is a cosmetic item they all use, but did you know that thousands of years ago, it was a luxury item that only a few could use?



The lip bar or lipstick began to be used more than four thousand years ago in ancient Mesopotamia, an area of the Middle East located between the Tigris River and the Euphrates River, which includes several areas between Iraq, Turkey, and Syria today.

People made lipstick by crushing expensive pigments and minerals to color their lips and eyes. They used them mostly to demonstrate power, superiority, and to decorate their faces as a symbol of beauty.





In ancient Egypt, different dyes and pigments were crushed to create different colored lipsticks. Despite the advances of the time, some of the substances used were toxic. For example, bromine was used and caused some serious diseases.

Some of the pigments used were obtained from different insects. They used cochineals or kinds of beetles to get the red or carmine color. They caught the insects, dried them, crushed them, and created a powder to use as a dye and then mixed it with other ingredients to give lipstick a bright color. Oils from animals and vegetables along with waxes and scales from different fish were used to create that bright, pearly tone.

The use of lipstick has gone through many stages throughout its history. It has enjoyed stages of acceptance where it was considered fashionable, and women wore it. Then, there were times when it was considered demonic, like in Medieval Europe.

From the 16th century, during the reign of Isabella I, it was considered a symbol of beauty. Women would have pale or whitish colored makeup on their faces and bright red lips. Painted lips were sometimes considered a social status since not everyone could afford to buy it.



But as we know, times change, and 200 years later, women who used lipstick were condemned for witchcraft. Therefore, makeup was strictly prohibited.



During the reign of Queen Victoria in the 14th century, makeup was used by women with low reputations, and so was considered vulgar. However, in other countries, such as the United States, it was a show of liberation for women to demonstrate their power and emancipation.











Gradually, the practice of painting lips red gained more and more popularity. Famous movie actresses began using lipstick to beautify their faces.

Currently, we can find lipsticks in different formats, such as bar, pencil, or gloss, and with different finishes, such as matt, gloss, or water resistant.





The colors have also changed throughout time, going from red and pink colors to oranges, brown, even purple, blue, green, and black.

For some years now, it has been seen as a fashion trend to have the color of the nails and lip match. Prices have also changed so anyone can afford to buy it.






